August 19th was the 200h anniversary of the engagement between the United States Navy frigate Constitution ("Old Ironsides") and H.M.S. Guerriere that ended in a complete victory for the American vessel. That battle established the U.S. Navy as a legitimate fighting force and resulted from superior American technology, tactics, and teamwork.

The technological superiority enjoyed by Constitution came from the genius of ship designer Joshua Humphreys, who designed a frigate that was powerful, fast, and rugged. Constitution was more heavily armed than any

He noted that he had heard a lot of information about the War of 1812 during the past month, and encouraged citizens to become more knowledgeable of the role the War played in the history of our great nation and citizens of Terrell County. slimmer hull gave it speed to elude any opponent

the captain chose not to engage. Also the extensive use of (Georgia) live oak, five times denser than other oaks and available only in the southeastern United States, in a three-layer closely-spaced design gave the vessel's hull an "iron-like" quality. (Hence "Old Ironsides")

Captain Isaac Hull cunningly maneuvered the ship close to the Guerierre, allowing the British to fire first, but on the up roll of the waves, which sent British shot high into Constitution's rigging where it did little damage. The American gunners, by contrast, waited to fire on the down roll, striking Guerriere's hull and masts. The British ship was left unsalvageable and Captain Hull burned it.

Constitution went on to win a series of victories during the war, but the victory over Guerriere was vital in establishing the fighting ability of the fledgling U.S. Navy for both its own officers and men and for its British opponents.

Retired from active service in 1881, she served as a receiving ship until designated a museum ship in 1907 and in 1934 she completed a three-year, 90-port tour of the nation.



Constitution sailed under her own power for her 200th birthday in 1997, and again in August 2012, to commemorate the 200th anniversary of her victory over *Guerriere*



Bicentennial Minute

When the War of 1812 began, the U. S. had only 7,000 men in the regular army. Leadership was woeful. The Secretary of War, William Eustis, was a physician who had tended to the wounded at Bunker Hill during the American Revolution. He knew little about military matters.

The senior officer of the army was another doctor, Major General Henry Dearborn. He, too, had little ability.

William Hall, another Revolutionary hero, was made brigadier general and was sent to march from Detroit into Canada. Hall failed and was forced to surrender. Other disasters followed.

While these discouraging events were occurring on the battlefronts, the presidential election of 1812 took place — the first ever held in wartime. James Madison was re-elected, winning over DeWitt Clinton.
